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**Warwick Bridge School Pupil Premium Spending 2019-20**

**Review Date: July 2020**

Pupil Premium funding is added to our school budget to provide additional support to looked after children and those from low income families. This extra funding is made available to help narrow the attainment gap between pupils from disadvantaged families from less deprived families. From April 2012, Pupil Premium was extended to include children who have previously been eligible for free school meals (FSM) at any point in the last 6 years (FSM 6).

Our Pupil Premium funding amounts to (per child):

- Pupil Premium: £1,320
- Pupil Premium Plus (looked after children): £2,300
- Service children: £300

The leadership team at Warwick Bridge School - including the governing body - strive to ensure that all Pupil Premium funding is used to provide the best possible outcomes for children in receipt of it.

At Warwick Bridge School we:

- Monitor and evaluate the progress made by Pupil Premium children and where necessary provide interventions and support to close any gaps in attainment;
- Ensure that Pupil Premium funding is carefully targeted;
- Make use of evidence to ensure that the funding is spent in ways known to be most effective;
- Encourage parents and carers to apply for free school meals by removing the barriers to its take-up.

As a school, we have a good record of addressing the needs of all of our children, particularly those who qualify for Pupil Premium funding. We do not rely solely on raw data to inform our understanding of how our children are progressing; we gather additional evidence in the forms of observations, pupil progress meetings, interviews and case studies from specific children and learning walks.
